#### **IMPORTANT RULES FOR 2023**

#### NEW - Premium waiver Statement

The Department of Agriculture shall use its best efforts to secure sufficient appropriations to fund premiums in any year for which the General Assembly of the State of Illinois fails to make an appropriation sufficient to pay such premiums, premium amounts may not be accurately reflected in the premium book. Mercer County Fair Premiums are contingent upon state funding.

Entries in classes J & L will be accepted 8:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. Tuesday, July 11, 2023. Entries in all departments except J & L must be postmarked by June 30, 2023 NO EXCEPTIONS WILL BE MADE. All entries must be made on an official entry blank found on the Fair website (<a href="https://www.mercercountyfair.org">www.mercercountyfair.org</a>). Only one person per entry blank. FEES FOR ALL ENTRIES, TICKETS, AND STALLS OR PENS MUST ACCOMPANY ENTRY. (This is a Department of Agriculture ruling).

All livestock to be exhibited are subject to spot checks of tags and registration papers by the department superintendent. Entries in Junior Show will follow the same rules as the Open Show, including entry fee, stalls, etc. If you enter the Open Show, no stall fee will be charged for the Junior Show.

#### From the State:

<u>Junior Age Requirements (effective January 2006).</u> Junior classes are eligible for premium State aid only if they are open to boys and girls who are 8 years of age or in third grade, and not yet 19 years of age on or before September 1 of the year previous to the fair. All animals (i.e. individual, her or flock classes) shown in junior classes must be the property of the boys and girls showing them. If the same animals are shown in both the open classes and junior classes, they shall be shown under the same exhibitor's name (for example, the father is not permitted to show an animal in the open class and the son or daughter to show the same animal in the junior classes).

<u>72-Hour Rule:</u> Exhibits and livestock are required to be in place for exhibition on the fairgrounds for a minimum of three days, except for exhibits and livestock in 4-H club shows, junior shows, one-day shows, and in Departments C, D, E, Q, R, S, T, V, and Z. The county fair board may require specified exhibits and livestock to stay beyond the minimum 72-hour exhibition time.

NO PAPER BEDDING. NO ALCOHOL IN LIVESTOCK BARNS.

Exhibits and premium checks for departments J - P1 may be picked up between Noon and 2:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 16, 2023.

Exhibitors in all other departments MUST sign for and pick up checks before July 16 at 4:00 p.m. or bring a self-addressed, stamped envelope and sign a waiver.

The Secretary's Office will not be open AFTER July 16, 2023.

#### CONCESSIONS PLEASE NOTE:

All concessions are regulated by the superintendent of concessions. He shall have control of the concessions and privileges and collect all the rent.

#### CAMPING AT THE MERCER COUNTY FAIR

RV campsites are limited at the fair.

They will be assigned on a first reserved basis.

Cost - \$30/night

10 sites are available at the campground behind the grandstand with 30 amp hook-up.

The carnival campers are on the east side of chain-link fence. All other campers are west of the fence.

Exceptions will be for: FAIR BOARD MEMBERS, CONCESSIONAIRE VENDORS, AND CARNIVAL ASSOCIATES ONLY.

#### NOTICE

Regulations and General Arrangements This exhibition will be open on July 11-15, 2023

### All entries except Dept J & L must be mailed to the Secretary, Mercer County Fair, PO Box 141, Aledo, IL, and postmarked no later than June 30, 2023.

#### **ENTRIES FOR PREMIUMS**

- 1. All persons may compete for premiums unless otherwise specifically designated, whether residents of Mercer County or not. All exhibitors are required to purchase an Exhibitor's Ticket. This ticket will allow the purchaser to make entries in any department and free admission of self to the grounds during the week of the Fair. Also, all entry fees and stall fees must be paid before exhibit will be judged.
- 2. All animals and articles exhibited for premiums must be entered in the superintendent's book in the proper departments and number mentioned in the Premium List. Entries having been made will not be changed by the Secretary unless an error has been made by him and entries of animals or articles in wrong classes will debar them from competition unless corrected before the entries close.
- 3. No exhibitor will be allowed personally to have access to the books of the secretary during the Fair, but may on application have such explanations are necessary made by the Secretary.
- 4. Products of mechanical, artistic, or scientific skill must be entered by the manufacturers, artists, contrivers, or by their legally authorized agents. The Secretary may require proof of the above by exacting an affidavit. Products of the soil must be entered by the producer or agent. Animals by their owners or agents. Secretary may require proof of the ownership affidavit.
- 5. Any animal may be entered singly as one of a herd or pair in speed ring and in sweepstakes, but otherwise, no animal or article can be entered more than once or drawn more than once premium except in Department H.
- 6. Any person making an entry of an animal or article, misrepresenting the same in any way, will forfeit the premium and be excluded from competition.
- 7. No superintendent will be permitted to enter or exhibit in any department to which he or she is superintendent.

#### PREMIUM PAYMENTS

For the benefit of all exhibitors, the Fair Board has authorized that all entry fees and state appropriation monies will be kept separate. The Secretary and Treasurer will pay these amounts to the exhibitors. Required by state law that exhibitors must secure their premium money and sign receipt for the same before exhibits will be released. All premium money not called for within 30 days from the last day of the fair shall be forfeited to the Association.

#### **AWARDING PREMIUMS**

- 1. The Superintended shall annually appoint an expert judge or judges for their department and report to the Secretary.
- 2. Judges shall report themselves to the department Superintendent at the designated hour set by the Superintendent.
- 3. The Judge will examine the animals or articles entered under each number in their departments in numerical order and mark the blanks in the award books to which they awarded the premium. The Judge and Superintendent will then sign the report and return it to the Secretary.
- 4. When doubts arise, the department may require evidence that any animal or article belonging property to the department and number in which it is entered and if they become satisfied that a wrong entry has been made, they will award no premium.
- 5. Exhibitors are expected to promptly obey the Superintendent in producing their stock and failing to do so and failing to have them in time and place, they will be ruled out of competition.
- 6. Superintendents may require exhibitors of thoroughbreds or standard bred stock to furnish affidavit that are the same as thoroughbred or standard stock.
- 7. The Superintendent may recommend discretionary premiums but the amount thereof shall be determined by the Executive Board.
- 8. No premiums shall be awarded or any articles to which a premium has previously been awarded by the Society, and the Superintendent may require an affidavit that the article has never taken a premium before.
- 9. Any exhibitor who shall interfere or attempt to influence the Judge while making awards shall be excluded from competition.
- 10. All stock drawing premiums shall be exhibited to the audience in front of the amphitheater when called for by the Superintendent.
- 11. All animals entered for exhibition shall be subject to the inspection of a competent veterinarian and those diseased will be refused admittance to the grounds.
- 12. No exhibitor may collect more than 2 premiums in any one class.
- 13. Any exhibitor found to be abusing an exhibit will be ordered from the fairgrounds, and shall forfeit all entry fees, passes, and any premium for which they are entitled.

#### **PROTESTS**

Protests designed to affect an award must be made by an interested party and notice given to the Superintendent of the department before the examination of the protested animal, or article is concluded and a written statement verified by affidavit setting for the reason for protesting must be filed with the Secretary on the day the animal or article is exhibited. A failure to fulfill this requirement will be considered as a waiver of all such objections by party protesting.

#### PAYMENTS OF PREMIUMS

The Fair Association reserves the right to pay the premiums pro-rata if the net proceeds of the Fair Association are not sufficient to pay the premium in full.

#### **EXHIBITORS PLEASE NOTE**

Due to conditions of the State Aid and the per-ratio of premium State Aid Fund by the department under the new law, the Mercer County Agricultural Society Board reserves the right to pay premiums herein listed on the basis of the published amounts.

Further, the Mercer County Agricultural Society Board reserves to itself the final and absolute right to reduce the amount of money offered in any classification in any department herein to conform to the anticipated state aid receipts.

Should it be necessary for this reduction to be made, it will be done prior to the day of the show. In paying premiums, no evidence of award will be recognized except the Judges Book properly signed by the judge and superintendent and not from ribbons or cards that may be attached to exhibits. Ribbons and cards sometimes become misplaced.

Persons applying for orders shall return empty tag, showing the exhibitor's number, department list number and entry number.

The post office address of the exhibitor must be given to the clerk when entries are made. No premiums will be paid on animals or articles removed from the grounds before the close of the Fair without the written permission of the Executive Board. Owners of premium stock refusing to exhibit same at the time indicated in the program forfeit the premium awarded.

ALL EXHIBITORS ARE REQUIRED TO USE DESIGNATED AREAS FOR TRAILER PARKING AND LIVESTOCK TIE OUT.

USE OF LARGE ROUND BALES FOR HAY OR BEDDING IS PROHIBITED.

#### SUPERINTENDENTS OF DEPARTMENTS

The Fair Board has implicit confident in its Superintendents in all departments. Should a question arise in any department, the Superintendent of the department is the sole judge as to such questions, and his or her decisions are final.

Superintendents will not leave their departments without placed a proper person in charge to watch the property.

While the Board assumes no responsibility whatsoever for loss or damage by theft or otherwise, the Board requests the Superintendents Use their judgment in looking after exhibitor's interests to the best possible advantage.

No property is to be removed from the appointed time on the last day of the Fair unless otherwise designated by the Superintendent.

No Superintendent will be permitted to enter or exhibit in any department to which he or she is Superintendent.

#### SUPERINTENDENT OF CONCESSIONS

All concessions are regulated by the superintendent of concessions. He shall have control of the concessions and privileges and collect all the rent.

#### OVERCHARGING NOT ALLOWED

All concessions must be charged a reasonable price for the goods they are selling regardless of its character.

Overcharging will be a violation of the Society's Rules and Regulations and any person violating this rule will be closed up and all payments that have been made will be forfeited to the society.

The Superintendent shall be the judge as to what constitutes an overcharge. This rule applies to all privileges sold on the fairgrounds.

#### **PRIVILEGES**

Any person buying a privilege, and not taking possession of the same themselves, or their agents, by Tuesday noon, of the week of the Fair, forfeits their privilege to the Society and all money heretofore paid on the same. The Superintendent shall reserve the right of cancellation at any time for reasons satisfactory to him on all contracts with concessionaires.

Each concessionaire must confine himself to the place assigned. Failure to do so will subject him to forfeiture of his privilege without reimbursement. Under no circumstances will any person or firm be allowed to place any advertising matter upon buildings, trees or any place on the grounds, nor will it be permitted to drive nails in any building, trees, or fence belonging to the Association. Not advertising matter can be distributed except under the supervision of the Superintendent.

Positively no concessions or shows will be allowed that do not comply with the State Sanitary Regulations or the Illinois Department of Agriculture of Springfield regulations with regard to gambling, confidence games, etc. All such will be excluded from the grounds. This Fair is in full cooperation with the Departments in Springfield in running a clean fair and will not tolerate anything of this nature.

#### CO-SUPERINTENDENTS OF GROUNDS

The Co-Superintendents shall, with the advice and other control of the Executive Board have charge of the Fairgrounds during week of the Fair. They shall assign to the departments their places.

- 1. The General Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Marshal, Gatekeepers, and Policemen shall be sworn-in conservators of the peace, and it shall be their duty to arrest and take before a magistrate anyone creating disorder or violating the rules of the Society or the laws of the State.
- 2. All possible care will be taken of stock or articles for exhibitors or otherwise brought upon the grounds but the Society will not be responsible for loss or damage.
- 3. In case the days of the Fair are stormy, the program for the day may be postponed or omitted and the Fair continued and the discretion of the Executive Committee.
- 4. No sleeping tents allowed on the grounds except under the direction of the General Superintendent.
- 5. Riding or driving on the track by any person or persons during exhibition, except when competing for premiums, is strictly forbidden. The Society will not be responsible for any damage to persons or property resulting from their being on the track. The general public is hereby warned that the track is dangerous territory during the exhibition hours and all other times.
- 6. The officers of the Society will take all practical care of all stock and other articles after arrival and arrangements on the grounds, but will not be responsible for any losses or damage that may occur to any person, animal or article. Exhibitors must see that articles for exhibition in the Floral Hall are delivered to the Superintendents. The Society cannot in any way provide transportation or be subject to any expenses either in the delivery or return from the grounds. The Superintendent will use diligent care to secure safety of articles after arriving and arrangements in the building, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.

#### REMOVAL OF OBJECTIONABLE EXHIBITS AND DISPLAYS

The management reserves the right to remove from the grounds any exhibit, animal, concession or show that may be falsely entered to be unsuitable or objectionable or to remove any sign, banner, or advertising matter of any kind which may be deemed unsuitable or objectionable to them, without assigning a reason thereof, and if necessary to return any money already paid for space or stalls, which shall exonerate them from any claim whatsoever on the part of the exhibitor or purchase.

#### **CLAIM FOR INJURY**

No claim for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted nor suit instituted or maintained against the Mercer County Agricultural Society, its officers or their agents, by or on behalf of any person, firm or corporation or their agents, representatives, servants, or employees having license or privilege to exhibit on the Fairgrounds or occupy any space thereon.

If any damage, loss or injury to person or property shall be proximately caused by reason of neglect or willful act of any persons, firms or corporation or their agents, representatives, servants or employees having license or privilege to exhibit on said Fairgrounds, or occupying space thereon the Mercer County Agricultural Society shall in no matter be responsible therefore and in case it is subjected to any expense or liability all persons causing same are liable, therefore shall indemnify the said Mercer County Agricultural Society of Aledo, Illinois.

Nor will any officers or employees of the Fair be permitted to negotiate assurance or to make any guarantee whatsoever regarding same. Property owners desiring insurance against fire or other protection must make their own arrangements therefore. No officers or employees have any authority to suspend or change this rule.

County Fairs

#### GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

These Exhibition Health Requirements apply to all livestock present at the fair including those animals that are not entered in competitive events.

- 1. Exhibitors are required to familiarize themselves with all rules applicable to their exhibits. All out-of-state animals shall require an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at (217)782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at <a href="http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php">http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php</a>.
- 2. All animals, except as noted, shall be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) which shows that the animal meets all health requirements for the State of Illinois. CVI's shall be made available to Bureau of Animal Health Personnel on request. CVI means a legible record made on an official form from the state of origin which has been issued, signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian and which shows the name and address of the animal's owner or exhibitor and the results of all required tests or vaccinations. A CVI shall list only one animal identification per line; shall be presented on the form on which it was initially issued; and shall not be corrected, changed or altered in any manner.
- 3. All animals shall be officially identified. The animal(s) official identification shall be recorded on the CVI.
- 4. If animals are from tuberculosis accredited, brucellosis certified, pseudorabies qualified, or brucellosis validated hers, the identifying her number(s), along with the date of the last herd test(s) shall appear on the CVI.
- 5. CVI for out-of-state livestock shall be voided thirty (30) days after issuance.
- 6. CVI for Illinois original livestock shall be voided ninety (90) days after issuance.
- 7. All livestock shall be subject to examination upon entry to any Illini showing evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall be immediately withdrawn and held in quarantine at the owner's risk and expense until properly treated and recovered, or until the animal is released to return to the owner's premise. Any livestock infected with scabies, mange, active lesions of ringworm, sore mouth, or multiple warts which are easily visible without close examination shall not be permitted to exhibit and are subject to quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds. Sheep and goats with gaseous lymphadenitis evidenced by draining abscesses shall not be exhibited and are subject to immediate quarantine or removal from the fairgrounds.
- 8. Illinois Department of Agriculture personnel or designee may collect blood, tissue, milk or urine samples from any animal being exhibited and/or raced at any Illinois fair to test for the presence of illegal drugs or banned substances. New examination techniques, such as ultrasound, may also be used at any time while the animals are on the grounds of any Illinois fair or exhibit. The Illinois department of Agriculture or designee may collect urine, blood, tissue or other test samples from any exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.
- 9. All exhibitors of animals at any Illinois fair or exhibition shall comply with the provisions of the Illinois Humane Care for Animals Act. If violations are observed, the animal(s) will be excused from exhibition and ordered removed from the grounds with all awards being forfeited. Any practice or deviation from normal, accepted care, including physical, medical or mechanical application, shall constitute a violation of show rules and may result in the animal(s) disqualification and removal from the fairgrounds.
- 10. Any Illinois cattle, bison, carvidae, or goats being exhibited in non-accredited free states must be isolated for the remainder of the herd/flock upon return to Illinois and retested for tuberculosis 60-120 days post-entry.

#### **CATTLE**

#### Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be either a fully healed and legible tattoo, approved official ear tag, registration number (can only be used if the tattoo is recorded on the registration certificate or for breeds where pictures are acceptable) or individual brands, if brand is recorded on the registration certificate.

#### **ILLINOIS CATTLE**

#### **BRUCELLOSIS**

Illinois is a Bovine Brucellosis Class-Free State. Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois cattle.

#### **TUBERCULOSIS**

Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin testing is not required for Illinois cattle

Please note: Illinois calves under 6 months of age and Illinois steers are not required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

#### **OUT-OF-STATE CATTLE**

All out-of-state cattle are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at (217)782-4922. Permits may also be obtained only at http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php.

#### Brucellosis

- 1. Female cattle six (6) months of age and older and bulls eighteen (18) months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within thirty (30) days prior to entry, unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
- A. Originate directly from a certified brucellosis-free herd.
- B. Official vaccinates of dairy breeds under twenty (20) months of age or official vaccinates of beef breeds under twenty-four (24) months of age.
- C. Animals originated from a "Class Free" state (if entire state is so classified)
- D. Steers and spayed heifers are not required to be tested for brucellosis.

#### **Tuberculosis**

- 1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States
- A. No tuberculin test required. All cattle, including steers, originating from an Accredited Tuberculosis Free State, may enter Illinois for exhibition when accompanied by a CVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days.
- 2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
- A. Cattle must originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
- 3. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to an additional tuberculin test conducted within 30 days prior to exhibition.
- C. Cattle that enter Illinois for exhibition and remain in Illinois (animal does not return to the state of origin within 30 days) must be isolated and retested for TB 60120 days from the last official TB test date.

#### **SWINE**

### Illinois Swine Identification

- 1. Swine shall be identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed dear notch.
- 2. Ear notch identification is acceptable for all barrows, crossbred gifts and breeding swine. (Note: Ear notch identification of crossbred swine does not satisfy USDA identification requirements for interstate movement of official testing.)

#### Brucellosis

Brucellosis testing is not required for Illinois swine.

#### **Pseudorabies**

Pseudorabies testing is not required for Illinois swine.

#### Out-of-State Swine

All out-of-state swine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available the calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at (217)782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at: http://www.agr.state.il.us/Animal HW/animalregistry/login.php.

- 1. Individually identified by an official ear tag, tattoo or recognized breed ear notch.
- 2. Ear notch identification is not acceptable for crossbred animals.

#### Brucellosis

- 1. Breeding swine 4 months of age and older shall be negative to an official test for brucellosis within 30 days prior to exhibition unless exempt by one (1) of the following:
  - A. Originate immediately and directly from a validated brucellosis-free herd.
  - B. Originate directly from a validated brucellosis-free state.
- 2. Swine brucellosis tests for exhibition shall be conducted at a state or federal laboratory.

#### Pseudorabies

- 1. Swine originated from a Pseudorabies Stage 1V or V state are exempt from the pseudorabies testing requirement.
- 2. Swine originating from a Pseudorabies Stage III state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within thirty (30) days prior to entry or originate immediately and directly from a qualified pseudorabies negative herd.
- 3. Swine originated from a Pseudorabies stage 1 or II state shall be negative to an official test for pseudorabies conducted within the 10 days prior to entry.
- 4. Barrows and females in market classes must meet the same requirements as breeding swine.

#### SHEEP

#### Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader. Ear tattoos may be used when a registration certificate listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal. When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state of APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database.

#### Market Lambs

All market lambs must be slick shorn (show ring ready) before weigh-in so that show lamb fungus can be identified.

#### Illinois Sheep

- 1. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
- 2. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

#### Out-of-State Sheep

All out-of- state sheep are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department

of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at (217)782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at: http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php.

- 1. Sheep originating from a flock that has previously been classified as either an infected or source flock can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved flock plan.
- 2. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

#### **GOATS**

#### Identification

Individual identification of each animal shall be by an ear tattoo or official metal or plastic tag. A microchip ID is acceptable if the owner provides the reader. Tattoos may be used when a registration certificate, listing the tattoo number, accompanies the animal. When using ear tags, the tag must indicate the premises ID and state of origin. The tag number must be assigned by a state or APHIS representative and recorded in the Scrapie Record Database. Ears should be used for tattooing when possible. If there is no space in the ear, the flank or tail fold may be used.

#### Illinois Goats

- 1. Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.
- 2. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

#### Out-of-State Goats

All out-of- state goats are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department

Of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at (217)782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at <a href="http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php">http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php</a>.

- 1. Goats originating from a herd that has previously been classified as either an infected or source herd can be exhibited in Illinois upon the completion of an approved herd plan.
- 2. Tuberculois Goats from areas or states that are not Accredited Bovine Tuberculosis Free, must be accompanied by a CVI indicating that the goats originated from a herd where a complete negative herd test has been conducted within the past twelve (12) months and the individual animals are negative to a tuberculin test conducted within thirty (30 days prior to entry. For any animal born after 1/1/2002, the CVI must include the flock of birth and the flock of origin, if different.

#### HORSES, PONIES, MULES AND OTHER EQUIDAE

#### Illinois Equine

- 1. All horses and other equidae, twelve (12) months of age and older attending an advertised equine event, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infectious anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
- 2. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
- 3. An advertised equine event means a show, rodeo, sale, auction, exhibition, trail ride, or horse fair that is posted or media promoted.
- 4. A CVI is not required for Illinois equine.

#### Out-of-State Equine

All out-of-state equine are to be accompanied by an entry permit. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at (217)782-4944. Permits may also be obtained online at: http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php.

- 1. All horses and other equidae entering Illinois that are twelve (12) months of age or older, shall be accompanied by a negative test for equine infections anemia (EIA) conducted within the last twelve (12) months. A copy of this test shall accompany the animal.
- 2. AGID (Coggins) or ELISA tests are accepted.
- 3. All horses and other equidae shall be accompanied by a CVI issued within thirty (30 days prior to entry.
- 4

#### **POULTRY**

- 1. All entries (except waterfowl, i.e. domesticated fowl that normally swim, such as ducks and geese) in a show or exhibition shall have originated from a U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent hatchery or flock OR have a negative pullorium-typhoid test within 90 days prior to exhibition. Exhibitor shall show proper information as to name and address of owner or exhibitor, name and address of the authorized testing agent, date of the testing and the number, breed, and species of those tested.
- 2. Prior to being used to transport poultry to a show, all crates, boxes, containers and vehicles shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.
- 3. Any poultry vaccinations must be performed at least 4 weeks prior to delivery to the show.
- 4. Upon admission to a show, all entries shall be examined by the official county fair veterinarian or qualified state personnel who shall also receive and examine all certificates necessary for admission of birds to a show. Birds not in show condition will be excused from exhibition and removed from the premises. Any fowl showing signs of illness during the fair will be removed from the exhibition grounds.
- 5. All out-of-state turkeys must originate from flocks that are officially classified as U.S Mycoplasma Gallisepticum Clean in accordance with the provisions of the National Poultry Improvement Plan or be negative to a test for Mycoplasma gallisepticum within 30 days prior to entry.
- 6. A permit is also required for out-of-state poultry. A permit may be obtained by calling (217)782-4944. Please note: These poultry exhibition requirements do not apply to 4-H and FFA 1-day poultry shows where the entries are taken to the show and returned home the same day. However, a permit is required for out-of-state poultry.

#### CERVIDAE

(Deer, Elk, Reindeer, Caribou, Moose, Red Deer, and other Related Species)

#### Identification

All animals shall be individually identified with an approved tag, microchip or tattoo. Elk are required to have two official/approved unique identifiers.

#### Illinois Cervidae

#### Chronic Wasting Disease

For cervidae changing ownership or moving within the State, the owner must obtain a permit issued by the Department prior to movement and the cervid must originate from a herd that is enrolled in the Certified Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) Program or the Contained Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease Program. The permit shall be obtained no more than 72 hours in advance of the movement of the cervids by providing the following information:

- Name and complete mailing address of person exhibiting the cervids;
- B. Certified Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease or Contained Monitored Chronic Wasting Disease Herd number;
- C. Name and complete mailing address of location where the animals will be exhibited;
- D. Number of animals and unique identification of the animals.

#### Tuberculosis

Illinois is an Accredited Tuberculosis-Free State. Tuberculin test is not required for Illinois cervidae.

#### Out-of-State Cervidae

#### Chronic Wasting Disease

- All cervidae entering Illinois must be in compliance with the Illinois Wildlife Code (520 ILCS 5). For more information, contact the Illinois Department of Natural Resources at (217)782-6384.
- 2. All cervidae entering Illinois must be accompanied by permit from the Department and a certificate of Veterinary Inspection that
  - a. Has been issued by an accredited veterinarian of the state of origin or a veterinarian in the employ of the United States Department of Agriculture;
  - b. Is approved by the Animal Health Official of the state of origin;
  - Shows that the cervidae are free from visible evidence of any contagious infectious or communicable disease or exposure thereto, do not originate from a CWD endemic area (any county and surrounding counties where CWD has been diagnosed in the past five years);
  - d. Number and unique identification of cervidae in shipment.

#### Brucellosis

Cervidae six (6) months of age and older must have a negative brucellosis card or PCFIA test within sixty (60) days prior to entry.

#### **Tuberculosis**

1. Accredited Tuberculosis Free States

All cervidae twelve (12) months of age and over shall be negative to two (2) single cervical tests for bovine TB no less than ninety (90) days apart with the second test conducted within ninety (90) days prior to entry. These animals shall be isolated from all other members of the herd during the testing period unless they originate from an accredited, qualified or monitored herd.

- A. Cervidae from an accredited herd may be moved into Illinois without further TB testing provided that a certificate stating that such cervids originated from an accredited herd accompanies them.
- B. Cervidae originating from qualified or monitored herds may enter with a negative test within ninety (90) days prior to entry and a certificate stating that the animals originate from a monitored herd.
- 2. Non-Accredited Tuberculosis Free Areas or States (Not TB Free)
  - A. All cervidae shall originate from a herd where a complete herd test was conducted within the past year.
  - B. The individual animals entering Illinois must be negative to two (2) additional tuberculin tests conducted within 180 and 30 days prior to entry or exhibition.

#### **RATITES**

(Ostriches, Emus, Rheas, Cassowaries, and Kiwis)

#### Illinois Ratites

There are no requirements governing the movement of ratites within Illinois.

#### Out-of-State Ratites

- Must be accompanied by a CVI and permit number. Entry permits are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at (217)782-4944.
- 2. Individually identified by leg band or microchip.
- 3. Negative test for Avian Influenza within 10 days prior to entry.

#### **PIGEONS**

There are no requirements governing the movements of pigeons within or into Illinois.

#### RABBITS

There are no requirements governing the movements of rabbits within or into Illinois.

#### LLAMAS

There are no requirements governing the movement of llamas within Illinois. A permit and health certificate is required for out-of-state llamas. Entry permit numbers are available by calling the Illinois Department of Agriculture, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at (217)782-4944.

Permits may also be obtained online at http://www.agr.state.il.us/AnimalHW/animalregistry/login.php.

- All breeding cattle entered must be registered and names and registry number will be required when entry is made. Certificates of transfer to exhibitor will also be required in cases where animal has not been bred by those making entry.
- Before entries can be made in this department for any show, an exhibitor ticket of \$11.00 must be purchased.
- Exhibitors may make reservations for stalls in writing on their entry form.
- All animals, including steers, to be in place for judging before 8:00 p.m., Tuesday, July 12 except hereinafter specified. No animals to be removed from this department until after the 4-H auction is completed on Friday, July 14.
- All animals must have been examined by competent veterinarians and health certificates complying with state regulations governing such exhibitors presented at time of entry.
- Entry fee to non-winners will NOT be returned in this department.
- In making of entries to the superintendent of this department, their decisions shall be final and exhibitors are requested to cooperate with them to promote a good show and harmonious feeling throughout the Fair.
- 10. Only cattle kept for breeding purposes will be accepted for entry in the breeding classes and affidavits certifying to this effect may be demanded at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- 11. All entries in pair or group classes must be registered in the same exhibitor's name. This is a State rule.
- 12. Must be 10 or more heifers in a class before optional class will be used. This is the up to the discrepancy of the Superintendent. Please include birthdate of heifers on entry blank.
- 13. Commercial heifers will be shown by weight and must weigh in on Wednesday, July 12, 2023.

#### NOTICE

- Five entries are required in each class of breeding cattle unless approved by Superintendent.
- 2 In class where there are less than five, the Superintendent may substitute another age group of breed.
- Animals shown in herd and group classes must have been entered and shown in classes for single animals.

#### PAGEANT RULES

The Executive Committee of the Mercer County Fair Association and the Superintendent of the Pageant have the discretion of recall should any improprieties or negative circumstances occur. Any queen recalled will be succeeded by the next eligible runner-up. Conviction of any crime other than a minor traffic offense shall be cause for recall.
- 9. The winner of the contest agrees to appear in Springfield in January 2023 for the Miss Illinois County Fair Pageant, as well as participate in functions becoming of a queen which may arise during the year. Activities connected with the Miss Mercer County Fair should take precedence over and above all other personal appearances. She agrees not to participate in any other beauty pageant without permission of the Pageant Superintendent.
- 10. Candidates who are under age 18 must have parents/legal guardians' written consent.

In lieu of any entry fee, each entrant and his/her parents or support staff will pay regular gate admission of \$6.00 per person.

- Junior and Senior Division Age Information:
  - A. All entries that are 14 years of age or younger on the date of the local contest will enter in the Junior Division.
  - B. All entries that are 15 years of age and no older than 21 years of age as of the date of the local contest will be entered in the Senior Division.
  - C.A Junior Division contestant at the state contest cannot return to the state level Junior Division again. A previous Junior Division contestant can compete at the state contest in the Senior Division.
  - D. No Senior Division contestant can return to the state contest as a participant.
  - E. In either division, a contestant competing as a single can come back in a group, or, if in a group, can come as a single, one
- All contestants must supply their own equipment. There is no age limit for an accompanist. Accompaniment tapes are acceptable; however, tapes with background vocals for vocal talent will be disgualified.
